Can you pass on a thank you from North Shore Police Area Command in relation to the schools response yesterday. Obviously the training and emergency management drills come to use yesterday and worked well.

As we had received 90 calls for assistance in 5 mins yesterday our resource was stretched. As a result when we arrived on scene about 1 hour after the storm it was excellent for us to see the emergency management plan all working well. Students and staff accounted for, students in lockdown and staff performing their emergency management rolls effectively. Also the use of the school media to advise parents with information helped us too. That makes our job so much easier.

Also, please pass on thanks in the newsletter to the parents who assisted with operations, clean up and traffic & pedestrian control.

Also thank the parents for maintaining their composure and understanding during a situation that has a stack of uncertainty and distress.

Parents heard from Mr Campbell, Leader of the Gifted and Talented Education Committee, who explained the rationale behind the formation of the class, which is to cater for the educational needs of students. He outlined the difference between giftedness and talent, and explained that an appropriate educational setting is one of the ways an academic gift can be nurtured into a talent. Ms Read clarified the difference between high ability and high performance, emphasising that this class is for students of high ability. She described the process the school goes through over many years to identify students, and the professional development that all teachers at LEPS undertake to enable them to make informed decisions about the class. Mrs Chau introduced herself as the teacher for the High Ability class for 2020, and shared some comments made by students who are currently in the class, which clearly indicate that they have benefited enormously from this educational setting.

The Problems

In Lindfield, we have a community hall located just next to the IGA. It cost a lot of money to make, but there are some serious problems with it. Problem number 1 (the main problem), the community hall is rarely used. There are regular ballet and karate lessons in the hall. There are also some gatherings there that most people don't go to and they aren't usually that important. Problem number 2, the community hall has poor ventilation and it normally is very cold. Problem 4: We could put a disability ramp at the front and the sides of the community hall.

Classroom Science Week 3 Term 4 2019

Early Stage One students have been investigating materials, observing their properties and how they are made for different purposes. Students are observing, using their senses, a range of materials used to make specific objects, products, places and spaces.

Our Stage One students have been identifying how plants and animals are used for food and fibre products beginning with a look at bush foods and exploring how wool fibres come from a sheep.

Utilising the 'Melting Moments' Primary Connections unit, Stage Two students are examining and describing how adding or removing heat causes a change of state.

In line with the new Science and Technology K-6 Syllabus stage 3 are investigating how food and fibre are produced sustainably in managed environments for health and nutrition. They have begun the term investigating the effects of rising salt causing salinity and the impacts on sustainable systems.

Primary Ethics

Why I Teach Ethics

I had signed my daughter up for ethics classes since Kindy, but she never received them. She was in non-scripture with everyone else watching National Geographic videos.

When she was in Year 4, one of the two ethics teachers at Lindfield East literally grabbed me by the collar and said: "it's you and me mate – now you are not working on Tuesday mornings you have to teach ethics". We've never looked back.

I signed up via the Primary Ethics website, www.primaryethics.com.au, had the interview, did the online modules and took myself off to the two day ethics teacher training.

At the course there was an amazing mix of people from all sorts of backgrounds; among them self-employed and stay-at-home parents, teacher's aids, architects, grandparents, psychologists, a yoga teacher and a fork lift driver.....

The course encouraged us to think with more depth about the importance of exploring multiple opinions and ideas, and for these differences to exist in the classroom, without judgement. I knew I wanted my own children to reflect on the origins of their beliefs and be able to give explanations and examples of why they think the way they do.

So what ethics topics are relevant to children? I discovered this program is full of interesting topics targeted to specific age groups. To name a few:

- Imagining how others feel
- How do we treat living things?
- How do we disagree in a respectful way?
- Fairness

It certainly generates lots of interesting conversations!

One of the wonderful things about the ethics program is that the teaching plans, time recommendations and possible ideas that the children might explore are all laid out in very detailed lesson materials. The job of the ethics teacher is to deliver the lessons without offering any of our own conclusions or opinions. You are encouraged to use procedural questioning (which is all outlined in the course) to facilitate discussions.

Now that I've been doing ethics teaching for a few years I can reflect with these thoughts:


• I have contributed to my children's school community

- I thoroughly enjoy my child's school and have a greater appreciation of the skills involved in teaching
